
The Cushing Selectboard, Staff, Family, Friends and community would like to Dedicate this year's 2025 Town Report to Lisa M. Young.

Dear Friends,

It is an honor to serve the people of Maine, and I welcome this opportunity to update you on the work that has taken place in the Senate over the past year. My staff and I have addressed numerous issues affecting our state, and I would like to share some of the progress that we have made.

Since my *Social Security Fairness Act* was signed into law in January 2025, the law has been fully implemented and restored earned retirement benefits to 2.8 million Americans. More than 25,000 Mainers have seen their monthly benefits increase and have been issued more than \$184.5 million in retroactive payments. I am proud that this legislation has improved the lives of many retired firefighters, teachers, police officers, and other public employees and their spouses.

I was honored to become the first Maine Senator in nearly a century to lead the Appropriations Committee. Since I took this role last January, Congress enacted full-year appropriations bills before December for the first time since 2018. These bipartisan bills included full-year funding for Military Construction and the Department of Veterans Affairs, the US Department of Agriculture, and the Food and Drug Administration. At my request, these bills included nearly \$35 million in Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS) for local projects across Maine that will improve fire stations and emergency services, update municipal buildings, and support upgraded facilities at the Maine National Guard and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard (PNSY) in Kittery. This funding builds on the nearly \$1.1 billion in CDS I have secured since 2021 for worthy projects that benefit local communities and nonprofits across our state's 16 counties. As Chair, I remain committed to working to better ensure that federal spending and investments produce real results for the people of Maine.


I have also led other important legislative efforts this year that address problems many Mainers face. This includes bills that expand federal efforts to combat Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses and improve access to early testing for Alzheimer's disease. Provisions I authored to strengthen prevention, treatment, and recovery services for those struggling with substance use disorders and mental illness were included in the *SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Reauthorization Act* that was recently signed into law. An amendment I authored in this year's *National Defense Authorization Act* will increase apprenticeship opportunities at public shipyards like PNSY. That bill also includes more than \$400 million to support critical infrastructure improvements at PNSY and a well-deserved 3.8 percent pay raise for all our nation's service members.

In addition to advancing legislation, I worked to ensure that federal commitments to Maine were maintained and, when necessary, restored. I secured a seasonal employee exemption for Acadia National Park from the Administration's federal hiring freeze and from closure during the recent government shutdown. I protected local programs like Maine Sea Grant and global initiatives like the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) from harmful funding cuts. I led the effort to resume enrollment at Maine Job Corps centers and fought for full funding for Maine's public schools this school year. I preserved funding for the University of Maine System and secured the restoration of funding to the Passamaquoddy Tribe at Pleasant Point and the Penobscot Nation. I protected low-income Mainers' access to key programs like LIHEAP and SNAP. Although I voted against the *One Big Beautiful Bill Act* due to my opposition to Medicaid cuts, I helped secure \$50 billion to support rural health providers through the legislation's Rural Health Transformation Program. Maine has been awarded \$190 million in the first year of this five-year grant program.

Throughout my Senate service, I have never missed a roll-call vote and have cast more than 9,850 consecutive votes—reflecting the Maine work ethic I bring to Washington. My continued ranking as most bipartisan Senator from the Lugar Center and Georgetown University is a testament to Maine's tradition of working with cooperation and respect.



Dear Cushing Neighbors:

It continues to be an honor to serve you in the Maine House of Representatives. I am proud to be your advocate in Augusta.

Since taking office, one of the biggest issues I've heard loud and clear from constituents is that the rising cost of living is making it harder for working families to make ends meet. Household budgets just aren't going as far as they used to, and it's making it difficult for everyday Mainers to afford to build their lives here.

In 2025, the Legislature put working families first by passing measures to protect critical investments in health care, food security, education, child care and housing. But we still have a lot more work to do. This year, I will continue fighting for real solutions to help address the problems facing families here in our district and across the state, including tackling the rising costs of housing, health care, child care and energy.

As of this writing, we have just begun the second year of the two-year term. Over the next few months, we will consider hundreds of bills before we adjourn, which will likely be in mid-April. Once again, I am proud to serve on the Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee, where we oversee general fiscal policy and construct the biennial and supplemental budgets, as well as financial evaluations of state government agencies. I also continue to serve on the Taxation Committee, where we work on legislation regarding state and local taxes, municipal revenue sharing and property valuation and assessment, among other things.



Cushing Fire Department

Annual Report 2025

2025 was a busy year for Cushing Fire. Our Current roster has 12 members, 1 Chief, 1 Deputy Chief, 2 lieutenant's and 7 Fire Fighters. We are always in need of new members. If you are interested in helping your community while doing something that's extremely rewarding this is a great opportunity for you. There are many different jobs that are needed within the fire service so don't be scared to stop by and check it out. We meet the first and third Monday of every month.

In 2025 we responded to 68 calls. 23 Structure/Chimney Fires's/Mutual aid, 24 Fire/CO Alarms, 5 Ambulance Assist, 10 Motor Vehicle Accidents, 5 Utility/Traffic Hazards, and 1 search and rescue.

*After the approval to purchase a new 2,000-gallon tanker fire truck, that has been ordered.

* This summer the CFD was fortunate to receive the Stephen King Grant, with that grant we were able to purchase 10 air packs. 5 were purchased from the grant money and 5 was purchased from the budget. These were greatly needed to ensure the safety of the CFD Staff.

*Reminder to all, that anytime you have an alarm sounding it is crucial to vacate the property immediately and call 911. Carbon Monoxide poisoning is overlooked more often than one thinks. It is an odorless gas that can cause symptoms such as headaches, dizziness, nausea, vomiting, and eventually can cause loss of consciousness. This is why time is ever so important and you must always leave the property when alarms are sounding. Let us determine that there is no danger to you and your home. We will clear the home for you before determining that it is safe for you to return.

*Fail safe tested all our hoses and ladders, everything passed

*Greenwood did pump testing and maintenance on all 3 apparatus. All apparatus and pumps passed.

*Fire prevention was held on October 6 at the Cushing Community School. The students had lessons on fire safety in their home. They were giving time to explore the fire truck and equipment. They had some fun activities, were given some take home items.

*Please have a conversation with your child and make sure that they know their home address if there is ever an emergency at your home. Another good thing to do is practice home fire drills. Have a meeting spot outside so that your children know where to go. Check your smoke detectors every 6 months and change the batteries. If anyone needs help installing detectors or has questions, please contact a member of the fire department or the town office and they can get in touch with us. Carbon Monoxide detectors are also highly recommended.

*We ask anyone who has camps or summer homes that have become more year around residence to make sure that the roads are easily accessible for emergency vehicles. This means that the roads are clear of low hanging limbs and are wide enough for emergency vehicles to access and sanded and plowed if during winter months. Please make sure that your address is visible to the property to help ensure we can find you quickly and efficiently.

***Burn permits can be obtained through both Maine Forestry and Wardens Report Websites. Please make sure to always obtain a permit prior to a burn and always have it in hand along with the appropriate items required to put the fire out quickly if need be. Burn permits are free so don't risk the chance of getting a fine for not having one. Burn barrels are no longer legal to burn in.**

*** We had another successful pig roast. We thank the community for their support in this event. This helps the fireman's association purchase items throughout the year that are needed during meetings, training, or special events. A huge thank you to Shawn and Sarah Hiller for their donation of a pig for this event. It was greatly appreciated. We look forward to this event again in 2026**

It continues to be my honor and great privilege to serve as the fire Chief for Cushing Community. I couldn't do what I do if it wasn't for the dedicated men and women that work alongside of me. We continue to face daily challenges in this profession but are dedicated and committed to doing what needs to be done to continue to serve the people of Cushing.

Annual Report 2025

It has again been a busy year for EMA. We again had several large wind storms causing power outages, minor flooding and property damage. We continue to work through these storms individually to meet needs per each storm.

Knox County has had many struggles around our Emergency Dispatch Center this past year however there has been much improvement with staffing the dispatch center. They are almost up to full staff. Which allowed the dispatch center to take back the 911 system from our covering county. There is still a lot of work to be done but they are heading in the right direction.

Cushing's Community Warming Shelter is in the same building as the Town Office, and is a place where Cushing residents who are without power for an extended amount of time can go to get warm, or charge cell phones etc. We are currently trying to get a team of volunteers together for the warming shelter. This would consist of a 2-to-3-hour time block where you would go to the warming shelter to make sure that anyone who was in fact needing to utilize these needs were being met, whether it be charging phones, staying warm, or just having good conversation. This is something that rarely is needed in Cushing, but we want to make sure that we have it available. If anyone is interested in helping, please contact the town office. This does take a community and can't be done without a few people willing to help their neighbor.

It is not only a great idea but strongly recommended to have an emergency supply kit stocked and ready in the event of an outage. In your kit you should include the following items:

- * Three day supply of water (1 gallon per person / per day)
- * Non-Perishable food, and non-electric can opener
- * First aid kit, along with any prescription medication
- * Battery powered radio
- * Flashlight with plenty of extra batteries

Assemble your needed supplies and store them together in a central location.

***** IS YOUR HOUSE NUMBER VISIBLE? *****

For privacy reasons all dispatch information is given in relation to a property address only, no names are used over the air. For this reason, it is important that all properties are clearly identified with numbers visible from both directions on the street. The town requires that you have reflective street numbers, **4 inches high**, preferably on your mailbox. Crews and ambulances may be coming from either direction. In addition, for serious events, mutual-aid ambulances may be coming from out of town and those drivers will not be familiar with the area. Clear numbering may be critical in ensuring

the earliest possible treatment. **When you drive home at night, look at your mailbox. Can you see your number? No? Either can we.**



REMINDER TO RESIDENCE PLEASE MAINTAIN YOUR DRIVEWAY/ROAD IN THE WINTER MONTHS WITH PLOWING AND SANDING AND IN THE SUMMER MONTHS WITH BRUSH CUTTING AND ROAD REPAIR. IF YOUR DRIVEWAY OR ROAD IS IN HARD SHAPE DURING THESE MONTHS, IT MAY DELAY RESPONSE OF EMERGENCY HELP.

Thank you to the resident and business of Cushing in their continued support and generosity through gifts and donations to Friend of Cushing Rescue, our non-profit support group. With this support we are able to properly equip our ambulance to an advance level. Donations will let us buy supplies use on the ambulance and new apparel for our members.

Maine EMS continued grant funding with the Sustainability Grant Program which was a continuation of the Stabilization grant. This time around we were awarded \$15,000.00. This money was use to purchase 8 new portable radios, a training manakin, a simulator generator for the cardiac monitor. March of 2025 we took delivery of the new cardiac monitor LifePak 35. In May we did an open house for EMS week, we demonstrated the new monitor, stop the bleed station, blood pressure checks and had games for the kids. Residence was able to come and see the equipment and interact with the members of the department.

In 2025 we responded to 164 calls for service. This would be the highest run volume for the department. 145 of those calls required treatment and transport. The rest of the call included but were not limited to support of the Cushing Fire Department at fire scenes, patient refusals, traffic accident and mutual aid in 2025.

In closing we need the continued support of the people and businesses of Cushing. In the time of an emergency be calm and call 911.

BOARD OF ASSESSORS REPORT

TOWN REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2025

2025 marked a very successful year for the Assessing Office with the completion of our whole town reevaluation. The number of abatements processed after revaluation was remarkably low, reflecting the outstanding skill and expertise of our assessing agents and the high quality of the methods employed during the reassessment process.

The real estate market here has shown stability in the volume of sales over the past three years: 49 sales in 2023, 46 in 2024, and 48 in 2025. However, there has been a substantial decline in the total value of these transactions, with figures at approximately \$18.7 million in 2023, rising to around \$24.7 million in 2024, but falling to about \$10.7 million in 2025.

Since the end of 2022, 30-year mortgage rates have remained steady, fluctuating between 6% and 7%.

With last year's whole town reassessment, the total taxable valuation base of the Town increased from \$296,740,960 (figures based on 2012 market) to \$461,370,990 (based on 2024 market) which is approximately a 55% increase. Between April 1, 2024, and April 1, 2025, the town experienced another notable increase in taxable value. An additional \$1,741,290 was added to the total taxable real estate valuation, accompanied by \$148,838 in added personal property value. This growth resulted from new construction, property additions, and the completion of previously unfinished projects.

The Town of Cushing also observed a net increase of 10 homestead exemptions claimed from 2024 to 2025, bringing the total to 458. These exemptions lower the taxable valuation for year-round residents. For 2025, the state is reimbursing the town \$102,887.62 to offset the associated revenue loss.

In addition to physically conducting property reviews, processing deed transfers, and

handling exemption applications, the Assessing Office dedicated time to processing current use applications, reviewing intent to build permits, managing tree growth penalties, and interacting with residents through meetings and correspondence. Going forward, we will continue to strive for thorough reviews throughout the year to ensure assessments remain fair and equitable. This will ensure that property taxes are paid on current and fair market values across the town and to make certain the tax burden continues to be spread equitably.

All applications for deeds, exemptions, and current use programs—including first-time

Homestead Exemption applications—must be submitted by April 1, 2026, to qualify for that tax year. Applications received after April 1 will be considered for the subsequent year’s tax assessment. Please contact the Cushing Town Office soon to ensure your requests are processed on time.

A NOTE ABOUT CONTACTING THE ASSESSORS’ AGENT

To assist Cushing residents, the following information explains how to make in person contact with the Town Assessors’ Agent. This information is also available on the Cushing website.

The Assessors’ Agent, Garnett Robinson, or his staff, are scheduled to be present in the Cushing Town Office on Thursdays at variable times.

If the Assessor is not in the office on a scheduled workday, the expected return time will be posted on the door.

Appointments are recommended and can be scheduled by calling 207-354-2375 on Monday (8:30 AM – 4:30 PM), Wednesday (8:30 AM – 4:30 PM), and Friday (7:30 AM – 2:30 PM), or you may walk in on Thursdays to meet by chance.

We hope this information clarifies the process and makes it easier for residents to seek assistance with assessment issues.

A NOTE ABOUT TAXES AND MILL RATE

Property taxes are a common concern for many residents due to their rising costs. Historically, in Maine, the responsibility for funding public services has been based on the principle that individuals who possess more wealth should contribute a larger share toward public financing. In colonial times, wealth was primarily measured by property ownership, making it a straightforward indicator for determining tax obligations.

While modern definitions of wealth extend beyond just real property, Maine’s laws continue to rely on property value as the basis for taxation. Those who own more valuable property are required to pay a proportionally greater share of taxes compared to those with less valuable property. Because of this, it is crucial that every property be assessed accurately to ensure that the tax burden is distributed fairly according to property values.

The mill rate is the key figure in the calculation of property taxes. It represents the rate that is multiplied by the total assessed value of all properties in a town to determine the

amount needed to cover the town's budget. Once the mill rate is established, it is applied to the assessed value of each individual property. The result is the specific tax amount that each property owner is required to pay.

Public finances are comprised of three main components: funds for town government services, funds for Knox County services, and funds for public schools. Each of these entities requires financial support, which is provided through property tax revenues.

It is important for property owners to attend meetings where the budgets for these entities are discussed and voted upon. Participation in these meetings allows property owners to influence how the budgets are set. This involvement is the primary means by which individuals can exercise control over the amount of taxes they will be required to pay.

PLANNING BOARD

Annual Report 2025

The Planning Board (PB) meets the first Wednesday of the month at 6:00pm to review applications, consider revisions to town regulatory documents, discuss topics relating to land use, and communicate with the public.

Jay Jones left the PB and was replaced by Mark Christopher in June. The PB voted in officers at its September meeting as follows: Mark Christopher as Chairman; Susan Mansfield as Vice-Chairman; Gene Lukianov as Secretary. Tom Nichols prepares the meeting agendas while Austin Donaghy serves as Professor Emeritus. Each PB meeting is recorded as Gene and Austin operate and maintain the “Owl”.

The PB revised the Shoreland Zone Ordinance (SZO) based on review and comments from the Maine Department of Environmental Protection. After several working sessions the PB voted to accept the revisions to the SZO and present it to the public for comment. A public hearing was held on October 1, 2025 and several members of the public were in attendance. The PB prepared a summary of changes to the ordinance to compare the proposed and previous versions. Two notable changes include removal of forest management activities from Town regulation and the 30% size restriction on extension of existing structures in the Resource Protection District to be measured by surface area “footprint” rather than volume. A second public hearing is scheduled for January 2026 and the revised ordinance will be voted on at the March Town Meeting.

The PB reviewed the State of Maine L.D. 1829 “An Act to Build Housing for Maine Families and Attract Workers to Maine Businesses by Amending Laws Governing Housing Density” to discuss how this legislation affects the town Subdivision Regulation and voted to revise the Subdivision Regulation accordingly.

A draft subdivision application for the Sandy Lane Subdivision was received and an informal pre-application meeting was held with the applicant. A final and complete application was not received.

The PB submitted requests for proposals for land survey and appraisal services in support of a proposed deep water access project under consideration by the town. Contractors were selected and those firms were given notices to proceed.

A special thanks to those vessel operators who exercised a high degree of professionalism throughout Cushing waters. There are a negligible number of incidents here. We do have a few holdouts, commercial and private, who seem oblivious to the need for caution. I would remind all that these are commercial fishing waters. I ask all vessel operators to exercise caution around active lobster boats where the busy crew may be briefly unaware of a nearby vessel. Similarly, I ask our larger boats to reciprocate when it comes to speed and wake.

Public Water Access

This is an ongoing project which at the time of writing is in the property acquisition phase. When the property has been acquired by the Town, its use can be influenced by citizen ideas which will be submitted through an email from town citizens only. When this process opens up, instructions will be broadcast through the various town outlets.

Harbor Board

The Harbor Board now has a full quota of members and meets on the 4th Thursday of every month unless otherwise cancelled. This board will be the focal point for ideas for any future Town landing, incorporating these when necessary, into a set of use regulations.

Proper Mooring Markings.

Our Coastal Waters Management Ordinance currently defines mooring marking rules as:

- a. Each mooring marker shall bear the number of its permit or vessel identification, AND the watercraft or owner's name or initials.
- b. Guest moorings shall be marked by a white ball bearing the permit number or owner name or initials, AND the word GUEST.
- c. Service moorings shall be marked by a white ball bearing the permit number or owner name or initials, AND the word PRIVATE.
- d. Rental moorings shall be marked by a white ball bearing the permit number or owner name or initials, AND the word RENTAL.
- e. Aquaculture moorings shall be marked by a white ball bearing the permit number issued by Maine Department of Marine Resources.

A float that is not attached to a wharf by traditional means shall display reflective tape

Please observe all navigation buoys, speed limit markers and ordinance defined zones.

Animal Control Officer's Report 2025

The Animal Control Officer for the town of Cushing is responsible for enforcing animal control laws of the State of Maine. Duties include situations such as responding to reports of animals suspected of having rabies, complaints about loose or stray animals, and addressing concerns about domestic animals that might represent a nuisance or hazard to public health or safety. The Cushing Animal Control Officer is responsible for domestic animals only, not wildlife. The Inland Fisheries and Wildlife wardens are responsible for wildlife issues. There are revolving game wardens who cover multiple areas. You may contact the IF&W wardens by calling: 207-287-8000.

The State of Maine requires all dogs over the age of 6 months to be current with rabies vaccines and be licensed with the town. Dog licenses are issued each calendar year and cover from January 1-December 31. Licenses are available beginning October 15th of each year. Fees are \$6 per altered dog and \$11 per intact dog. Licenses can be obtained at the town office in person or over the phone. You may also register and renew licenses online by visiting: Maine.gov/online/dog license. There is a small additional fee to purchase a dog license online or over the phone. Be aware also that Maine charges a \$25 late fee per dog beginning February 1st.

Please visit the Cushing town website at Cushing.Maine.gov for news, events and information related to domestic animals. There is also a Facebook page, Town of Cushing Message Board, where you may learn about animals. That have been found or post a message about an animal that is missing. This is a useful tool so that we can all work together to help care for our community's animal friends. Note: There is currently no leash law regarding cats.

The Cushing Recreation Department would like to start off by thanking Gretchen Tripp for her over 10 years of service to being the Cushing Rec Director. Her dedication to the players, town and local leagues that we participate in are what have made this department such a success. Countless hours planning each season, coaching both soccer and basketball teams, as well as running clinics for each sport is not an easy feat on top of being a full-time teacher. She did a truly wonderful job supporting our towns' youth and has left some very big shoes to fill. On behalf of the town and all those who have come through this program over the last decade, we just want to say the biggest THANK YOU for all that you have done and continue to do.

Now for a recap of this year's youth sports.

In the Spring of 2025, Cushing Recreation sponsored 23 Cushing players who participated in Oceanside Little League which serves local youth in T-Ball, Minors Softball, Minors Baseball, Majors Softball and Majors Baseball. Jared Stackpole & Nathan Prior coached a Minors baseball team and with the help of others they cleaned up the Cushing Rec baseball field to host practices there.

Players in grades 3-6 participated in "assessments" for their respective groups which Directors and Coaches observed and then teams were split up evenly through a "draft" process. The Board of Trustees is grateful for the continued support the town of Cushing has provided to our community based library, where we offer free services and programs for all residents of Cushing. We are writing to ask for \$7,000 to continue to maintain and improve the library's services and collections.

Thanks to the dedicated support of our patrons and the town government, the library had a busy and wonderful year. We welcomed new patrons who were excited to utilize one, or many, of our services! We also welcomed two new excited volunteers to help us! Our two patron computers are available for free use, and the community can access our WiFi on a 24/7 basis from outside the library, by following information posted on the outer door. For those unable to visit the library, curbside pick-up service is available to take out books.

For families and children, we continued with our preschool story hour and craft time and ended with an ice cream party! Our Easter Egg Hunt was well attended, with 80 adults and kids in attendance, and over 1,000 candy filled eggs to find! We closed out the year with our Annual Holiday Event, where we hosted 71 kids and adults where they participated in games, themed crafts, a scavenger hunt and a visit from Santa.

2025 Cushing Recycling News

The Cushing-Friendship-Waldoboro Transfer Station (CFWTS) reports that residents are preparing their recyclables well.

The trash haulers, though, want to emphasize that some households are co-mingling all recyclables into one bin. Recycling in our town is **NOT SINGLE STREAM**. Households should pre-sort their recyclables.

Your trash haulers cannot take the time to sort your recyclables for you.

REMEMBER: at this time the only plastics accepted at the Transfer Station are HDPE (#2 plastics), RIGID PLASTIC, and GROCERY STORE PLASTIC BAGS



Look on the container's bottom for the chasing arrows recycling symbol containing the identifying #2 HDPE.

#2 Milk Jugs ("natural color" HDPE) plastics should be kept separate from other "colored" #2 HDPE plastics such as laundry or dish detergent jugs

RIGID PLASTIC: buckets, soda crates, plastic toys, plant pots, kiddie pools, truck liners are still being recycled at CFWTS.

- UPDATE: place Newspapers, Magazines, Mixed Paper and all Books *into one open bag*
- CORRUGATED CARDBOARD and Brown Paper Bags
- PLASTICS #2 HDPE "natural" and "colors"
- RIGID PLASTICS: buckets, soda crates, toys, pots pools, truck liners
- GLASS: clear, green and blue bottles (*not brown*) and jars, (no Pyrex or window glass)
- USED MOTOR OIL: deliver to Waste Oil Furnace at Todd Prior's Garage in Cushing

- PAINT: oil and acrylic. There is no charge for recycling oil or acrylic paint.
- HARD GOODS: appliances, refrigerators, freezers, toasters, dehumidifiers, etc.
- BATTERIES: batteries, car batteries, alkaline batteries, rechargeable batteries, watch and hearing aid batteries, etc. NEVER throw lithium-ion batteries into the hopper, because THEY ARE A SEVERE FIRE RISK.
- UNIVERSAL WASTE: computers, printers, TVs, radios
- FLUORESCENT and CF bulbs, thermostats, ballast, all other light bulbs
- BULKY WASTE such as couches, chairs, mattresses, rugs, etc.
- CDD construction/demolition debris
- BRUSH, trees smaller than 6" in diameter
- TIRES



Important suggestions from our trash haulers

HOW TO PREPARE WHAT YOU PUT INTO THE RED RECYCLING BIN

- ★ **MOST IMPORTANT:** Each household is responsible to *pre-sort the recyclables*. *Do not co-mingle the recyclables*. We are *not single-streaming*.
- ★ Bag like-items for easy pick-up by the hauler.
Do not seal any bags containing recyclables.
- ★ #2 plastic must be kept separate.
- ★ The following items are **Not Recyclable**: Kitchen plastic wrap, Boat Shrink Wrap, Styrofoam trays nor Foam Peanuts. They must go into the trash.
- ★ All *rinsed* metals, tin cans, aluminum can be mixed together.
- ★ UPDATE: Newspapers/Magazines, Mixed papers, and all Books go into one bag.
- ★ TETRA PAKS ARE NOT RECYCLED: juice, milk, broth, soup containers should go into the regular trash because their multiple layered construction is too difficult to recycle. So, put TETRA PAKS into the trash.
- ★ Leave paint in cans; do not seal into bags. CFWTS participates in a state-wide paint recycling program and CFWTS accepts oil and latex paints *without charge*.
- ★ CFLs or fluorescent light tubes must be protected from breaking.
- ★ Take used motor oil to be burned in Prior Garage's waste oil furnace in Cushing.

GRRSM Water Quality Report

December 16, 2025

Rainfall is a key factor in water quality as it brings pollution off the land into the brooks that run into the rivers and ocean. It is particularly important for the towns (of the Georges River Regional Shellfish Management) to educate their residents about picking up their dog's waste as well as taking care of other animal waste (horse, cow, chicken, etc.)

This year we lost Salt Pond and the Corner of Watts Cove due to pollution (there was an outhouse on Watts cove causing that closure). Fourwinds shut down in August. The Bay (Thomaston) had a couple of bad water quality scores in 2025. One was 180 by a cottage that was occupied summer and fall. The Code Enforcement officer for Thomaston was called in a couple of times to survey the scene, and he reported that everything looked all right. These test were run just a few days after rainfall and the state did not rule these results out, though the rule of thumb is to wait 8 days after rain to evaluate. This would have reduced the number of bad water quality scores. Georges River isn't the only area the State is closing. Waldoboro and Bremen lost a big cove. Georgetown lost their most productive cove. The State has been shutting down coves up and down the coast.

Diggers should be helping more to protect their living. They should be more involved with water testing and looking for the source of pollution.

FRIENDSHIP-CUSHING FOOD PANTRY NEWS

“Many hands make light work.” This age-old adage characterizes The Friendship-Cushing Food Pantry perfectly. Since its beginnings in 1987 and each year following, our pantry has grown and adapted to the times to best meet the needs of our community. This year the FCFP has, despite a reduction in federal funding and other sources, continued to serve our community in innovative ways. The pantry’s success relies on our many volunteers, local businesses, community organizations, schools and churches and individuals, who together have provided services, goods and monetary donations to keep our little pantry going in these times of rising costs and uncertainties.

Our volunteers are the engine of the organization. It all starts with a behind the scenes crew who order food, fill out paperwork, make out schedules, pick-up food from various organizations and businesses and unload pallets of orders from delivery trucks. It then moves on to those who give their time and talents each week to welcome and serve our clients, stock shelves and maintain the building and its grounds.

Our broader community, which includes the Cushing and Friendship village schools and neighborhood organizations have organized food drives that have provided valuable shelf stable items. The Medomak High School and individual donors have provided generous monetary donations that helped purchase perishables from local businesses like Wallaces Market, Hannafords and Walmart. The Friendship Ambulance Auxiliary Association, again this past year, gave a monetary grant to provide paper towels, toilet paper and coffee throughout the whole year.

Then there are the many individuals who have a special niche in the overall operation: the patron whose love of animals generously supports our pantry’s families dogs and cats with pet food (and then some), the prison bakery and the delivery people who provide us with fresh bread, rolls and cookies that arrive still warm to the touch, and the lady who stops by to bring boxes of jams and jellies from her church, as well as so many others who arrive with boxes and bags of donated goods to inquire, “Could you

use this?” We are certainly fortunate to be part of a thoughtful and caring community.

Last, but certainly not least, the many gardeners who put their love and time into tending the earth have generously donated fresh produce throughout the summer and fall. This year, there was a notable increase in these donations for which we are grateful. We thank The Friendship Garden Club as well as the many individuals and farmers who gifted us with the Bounty of their labor. In the end, our little pantry, like the Engine who said it could, keeps chugging along.

Our team at Georges River Land Trust (GRLT) is grateful for the opportunity to conserve and care for the lands and waters that sustain our Midcoast communities. For nearly forty years, we have worked throughout the 19 towns in the St. George River watershed to protect 5,495 acres of land with extraordinary conservation value across 23 preserves and 57 easements.

We believe that healthy ecosystems and diverse opportunities to access the outdoors help ensure we have a healthy and thriving community. With our passionate volunteers, we steward the lands we hold and maintain 80+ miles of hiking trails to ensure year-round access to nature and outdoor recreation. We offer free community programs across the watershed that build community, connect people with nature, and provide environmental education.

This year was a big year for us, thanks to our growing staff and volunteers. At Cushing's Langlais Art Preserve we offered a new slate of multi-age Creative Nature Programs, designed to inspire wonder, curiosity, and care for nature through art. These programs saw over 400 participants, including kids in our monthly early release day program for the Cushing Community School, led by Cushing educator Joan Sommers. In 2025, our visitation at Langlais nearly doubled over the previous year, supported by the draw of our expanded, 2.3-mile Woodland Trail and a contemporary sculpture installation, *Forest Geometries*. Langlais Art Preserve also received some significant regional and national attention, including features in Down East's "Great Maine Scavenger Hunt" and recognition as a new Affiliate in the National Trust's Historic Artists' Homes & Studios network. The site was selected by the Maine Office of Tourism for documentation for its 2026 national marketing campaign.



The Town of Cushing and its community are vital partners in the work we do. In addition to Langlais Art Preserve, Georges River Land Trust maintains the Cross Cushing and Pleasant Point Nature Preserves that offer over 3 miles of trails to explore. We also hold conservation easements with 5 private landowners that protect 165 acres of sensitive habitat in Cushing.

Many of our 1,000+ members and volunteers are Cushing residents. I am writing to request financial support from the Town of Cushing for Spectrum Generations’ essential programming that serves older and disabled adults in your community. The demand for our services continues to grow, but federal funding, while generous and valued, historically has not kept pace. With reductions in funding such as United Way paired with rising costs, and ongoing economic pressures, we are seeking a gift of \$1,385.

One of our vital programs, **Meals on Wheels**, delivers nutritious, flash-frozen meals and shelf-stable options to home-bound older and disabled adults. In the year ahead, **Spectrum Generations will deliver more than 291,000 meals across our communities, and we must raise \$650,000 annually in development funds just to maintain this service.** While we raise the needed funding, for the first time in six years, Spectrum Generations will establish a recipient wait-list that will quickly grow beyond one hundred people before Christmas – underscoring the urgent need for municipal support.

Beyond food, this service combats social isolation – especially in rural locations - and provides a wellness check with every delivery. For one in five recipients, the volunteer driver is their only consistent human contact, and often the gateway to broader support through our **Community Services Specialists (CSS)**. CSS staff connect individuals with health and wellness programs, Medicare counseling, financial management, home repair programs, caregiver support and other services. We are also committed to strengthening our volunteer network. **Local volunteers—recruited, trained, and supported through town investment—are the heart of our programs.** Not only do they assist older residents but also build stronger community connections – they are a lifeline.

Additionally, our three Adult Daycare programs, Personal Support Service professionals and Family Caregiver Specialists offer safe, engaging spaces and programs for older and disabled adults while giving caregivers essential respite, resources and connection. **Supporting caregivers is crucial to maintaining strong families and communities in Maine.**

Your support will directly benefit older and disabled residents in the Town of Cushing, ensuring they can live safely, independently, and with dignity. Thank you for considering this request to help us provide high-quality, compassionate services.

Healthy Kids – Cushing Report for 2025-2026

Healthy Kids is a community-based family and professional network offering support and educational outreach as a means of enhancing and improving the lives of children, parents and caregivers in Lincoln and Knox Counties. Healthy Kids has been the Child Abuse Prevention Council of Lincoln County since 1985 and expanded its prevention services to Knox County in 2023. Our organization emphasizes positive parenting and family support for all families through a wide variety of programs designed to help parents, caregivers and professionals in raising emotionally, physically and cognitively healthy children. *All of our programs and educational classes are free of charge.*

2024-2025 was our second full program year in Knox County (Sept 1, 2024 – Aug 30, 2025). During that time, Healthy Kids directly served more than 160 parents and 170 children. 3 parents and 4 children from Cushing have been regularly participating in our weekly Knox County playgroup and in our free fieldtrips this summer, which included Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens, the WW&F Railway Museum, blueberry picking and ice cream at Sweet Season Farm and apple picking at Hope Farm. Additionally, monthly take-home parenting tips are sent to Cushing Community School and teachers, reaching 70 PreK-5th grade students. Due to our active outreach through schools, daycares and local libraries, we feel confident other Cushing residents have engaged at some level in an additional 23,750 units of service provided through our social media activities (Facebook, Facebook Live and Instagram). Additionally, 147 parents actively engaged in our resource center and/or referral system. Participants of our programs include parents, teachers, students, children, day care providers, physicians, law enforcement, school board members, town council members and general assistance staff, service club members, inmates, and other community representatives including residents who may work with children outside the county and still receive professional training. Additional services provided by Healthy Kids include: Personalized parent coaching; community and school events; on-site weekly playgroups; a family resource center and lending library; a holiday toy drive; parenting classes at Two Bridges Regional Jail, Knox County Jail and Bolduc Correctional Facility; training for professionals working with children; a car seat program through emergency referrals; and stigma reduction campaign for families in recovery.

In 2025, as we marked our 40th year devoted to the prevention of child abuse and neglect, we hosted a free Family Fun Fair on July 20, 2025. Over 250 children and families participated, and we shared 110 free meals throughout the day while also offering a variety of family-friendly games, entertainment and educational resources. Healthy Kids will continue to provide services throughout Knox County and Cushing. Thank you again for your support!

Last year, Red Cross staff and volunteers worked throughout Knox County to educate residents on fire safety and preparedness. We made **6 homes safer** by helping families develop emergency evacuation plans.



Knox County is home to **22 American Red Cross volunteers**. On behalf of New Hope Midcoast, the Regional Domestic Violence Resource Center serving Sagadahoc, Lincoln, Knox, and Waldo Counties, we thank you for partnering with us to serve the people of Cushing as we work to keep our communities safe from the potentially devastating effects of domestic abuse. We know that domestic abuse not only impacts the victim, but can also negatively impact children's mental health, social development, and school performance. The victim and concerned others may experience difficulties focusing at work, thereby limiting job performance. Creating safer neighborhoods by increasing awareness of the critical issue that is domestic abuse, is key.

A member of the Maine Coalition to End Domestic Violence, best practices inform New Hope's work. During the last fiscal year spanning October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2025, our trained, trauma-informed advocates served 375 Knox County residents requiring 1,093 staff hours. We also provided 1,279 nights of shelter for Knox County residents who left their circumstances, and offered 312 hours of community education and prevention for 2,010 residents.

It is a round-the-clock job to address the public health crisis that is domestic abuse. Now entering our 45th year of serving midcoast Maine, we sincerely appreciate our collaboration with the Town of Cushing.

OPINIONS

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and the aggregate remaining fund information of Town of Cushing, Maine, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2025, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town of Cushing, Maine's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Cushing, Maine, as of December 31, 2025, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

BASIS FOR OPINIONS

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Town of Cushing, Maine, and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

The combining nonmajor fund financial statements, schedule of property valuation, assessments, and appropriations, schedule of taxes receivable and schedule of departmental operations are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and related directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining nonmajor financial statements, schedule of property valuation, assessments, and appropriations, schedule of taxes receivable and schedule of departmental operations are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

This information is useful in assessing the Town’s financing requirements. In particular, the unassigned fund balance may serve as a benchmark of a government’s net resources for spending at the end of the year.

At the end of the year, the Town’s governmental funds reported a combined ending fund balance of \$3,699,273, an increase of \$256,825 from the prior year. Approximately 56% of the

Art. 44. To see if the Town will vote to accept and appropriate, for the purposes for which they are received, the proceeds of all grants made to the Town during the Town's fiscal year by the federal or state government, their agencies and authorities; and to see if the Town will vote that any necessary matching funds be appropriated by Town Meeting and that any substantive conditions other than a standard grant condition regarding spending only for the purpose for which the grant is made, be approved by Town Meeting.

Art. 45. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the municipal officers to dispose of town-owned personal property under such terms and conditions as they deem advisable.

Art. 46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, donations, trust funds, and contributions in the form of money, personal services, and materials for the benefit of the Town, its government including legal departments and public facilities thereof, for the purpose of aiding and enhancing the delivery of public services. Said gifts to be without conditions and not require the voters to raise additional maintenance money.

Art. 47. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board to borrow money in anticipation of tax receipts and to borrow or transfer funds as they deem advisable to meet unanticipated year 2027 budget accounts from January 1, 2027, until the 2027 annual meeting.
