

What Ballot Do I Get?
March 3, 2020 Presidential Primary and Special Referendum Election

Who Am I	Do I Get a State Primary Ballot?	Do I get a State Special Referendum Ballot?	Do I Get a Municipal and/or School Ballot?
16 – Pre-registration (Note: not eligible to vote in any election)	No	No	No
17 and <u>won't</u> be 18 on or before November 3, 2020 (Note: not eligible to vote in any election)	No	No	No
17 and <u>will</u> turn 18 on or before November 3, 2020	Yes – if enrolled as a D or R, I get that party's ballot	No	No
18 and <u>not</u> enrolled in the Democratic (D), Green Independent (G) or Republican (R) Party (i.e. registered as “unenrolled” voter)	No, unless I enroll as a D or R, and then yes – the ballot for the party I'm enrolling in (<i>no 15-day waiting period</i>)	Yes	Yes
18 and enrolled in the Democratic or Republican Party	Yes, for the party I'm enrolled in. I <u>cannot change</u> enrollment and vote in another party (<i>15-day waiting period would apply</i>)	Yes	Yes
18, a township voter , and enrolled in the Democratic or Republican Party	Yes, for the party I'm enrolled in. I <u>cannot change</u> enrollment and vote in another party (<i>15-day waiting period would apply</i>)	Yes	No
Voters enrolled in or enrolling in the Green Independent Party	No – the Green Independent Party is not participating in the Presidential Primary	Yes	Yes

Note about Inactive voters:

- Inactive voters who are not enrolled may enroll in a party on Election Day in order to participate in that party's Primary – there is no 15-day waiting period.
- Inactive voters who were enrolled in a party at the time Inactive status was designated may participate in that party's Primary; they may not change enrollment on Election Day and vote in another party, because the 15-day waiting period will apply.
