

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share several key accomplishments for our state from the previous year.

As Vice Chair of the Appropriations Committee in 2024, I have secured nearly \$580 million for 230 projects across all of Maine's 16 counties to promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; support law enforcement; improve public education and infrastructure; and protect our environment. As the new Congress begins, I am honored to be taking the helm of the Committee, the first Mainer to do so in nearly a century, and I remain committed to ensuring that federal spending produces real results for our state and nation.

Maine has the oldest average age in the country, which is why I have long prioritized health-focused legislative efforts. There were more than 1,860 health care bills introduced during the 118th Congress. Only 15 health care bills were signed into law, and I was a lead sponsor of five of them. These bills will enhance care for individuals with Alzheimer's, autism, and substance abuse issues through improved research funding, strengthened public health programs, and increased support for rural first responders.

Another important bill that I coauthored was the *Social Security Fairness Act*. Since 2003, when I led the first-ever Senate hearing on the Windfall Elimination Provision and the Government Pension Offset, I have sought to end these provisions of the *Social Security Act* that unfairly reduce the Social Security benefits that public employees or their spouses have earned. I am pleased to say that with the passage of my bill, the *Social Security Fairness Act*, in December, public sector retirees will now receive the full Social Security benefits they have earned.

When the Maine way of life was under threat, I was certain to defend the interests of our state. I worked to protect Maine's potato farmers when the Department of Agriculture tried to reclassify the potato from a vegetable to a grain. I thwarted efforts to consolidate USPS mail operations at the Hampden postal facility, which would have disrupted mail delivery throughout our state. I sounded the alarm with leaders at the FBI and Departments of State and Treasury on the spate of illicit marijuana growing operations that are destroying properties and providing refuge to foreign criminals in our state. Following damage to our working waterfronts after last winter's storms, I secured \$15 million to help fishing communities recover. I championed funding to support the Maine Air National Guard base, Bath Iron Works, and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard.

As of last December, I have cast more than 9,100 consecutive votes, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997. My ranking as the most bipartisan Senator reflects Maine's tradition of working with a spirit of cooperation and respect.

Dear Friends,

As we welcome the New Year, I want to extend my sincerest well wishes for 2025: to you, your loved ones, and your community. I'd also like to share an update on what my team and I have been working on—and how we intend to continue serving Maine's First District in the next Congress.

One year ago, our state was reeling from a series of unprecedented winter storms. Thanks to the efforts of local, state, and federal officials, we're starting to rebuild. The Federal Emergency Management Agency and the Small Business Administration approved more than \$10.7 million in federal assistance for Maine households, businesses, and homeowners in the months following the storms. In addition, Maine received a \$69 million grant from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to support the climate-resilience goals outlined in *Maine Won't Wait*. More help is needed, no doubt, and I will continue to advocate for the support our state deserves. For more information about available resources, go to pingree.house.gov/disasterresources.

In 2024, \$1.7 billion in federal grant funding came to Maine—encompassing everything from conservation efforts and home-heating assistance to resilient infrastructure and affordable housing. My team was able to secure \$1.4 million in refunds for Maine taxpayers, along with \$639,000 in Social Security benefits. We also helped thousands of constituents file for work permits, veterans benefits, and passports, and wrote countless letters of support on behalf of our constituents.

I'm so proud of what we achieved in 2024, and I'm fully committed to building on those accomplishments in the 119th Congress. As ever, my team and I are ready to assist however we can. 

Cushing Fire Department

Annual Report 2024

2024 was a busy year for Cushing Fire. Our Current roster has 13 members. We lost a few members as well as gained a few in 2024. We are always in need of new members. If you are interested in helping your community while doing something that's extremely rewarding this is a great opportunity for you. There are many different jobs that are needed within the fire service so don't be scared to stop by and check it out. We meet the first and third Monday of every month.

In 2024 we responded to 71 calls. 25 Structure/Chimney Fires's/Mutual aid, 15 Fire/CO Alarms, 7 Ambulance Assist, 9 Motor Vehicle Accidents, 10 Utility/Traffic Hazards, 2 Smoke Investigations, 1 major woods/grass fire, and 2 flooded basements.

*Reminder to all, that anytime you have an alarm sounding it is crucial to vacate the property immediately and call 911. Carbon Monoxide poisoning is overlooked more often than one thinks. It is an odorless gas that can cause symptoms such as headaches, dizziness, nausea, vomiting, and eventually can cause loss of consciousness. This is why time is ever so important and you must always leave the property when alarms are sounding. Let us determine that there is no danger to you and your home. We will clear the home for you before determining that it is safe for you to return.

*Fail safe tested all our hoses and ladders, with the exception of a couple hoses everything passed. That equipment has been replaced and now all equipment passes state requirements.

*Greenwood did pump testing and maintenance on all 3 apparatus. All apparatus and pumps passed.

*Fire prevention was held on October 20, at the Cushing Community School. The students had lessons on fire safety in their home. They were giving time to explore the fire truck and equipment. They had some fun activities, were given some take home items and even had Smokey the Bear join them.

*Please have a conversation with your child and make sure that they know their home address if there is ever an emergency at your home. Another good thing to do is practice home fire drills. Have a meeting spot outside so that your children know where to go. Check your smoke detectors every 6 months and change the batteries. If anyone needs help installing detectors or has questions, please contact a member of the fire department or the town office and they can get in touch with us. Carbon Monoxide detectors are also highly recommended.

*We ask anyone who has camps or summer homes that have become more year around residence to make sure that the roads are easily accessible for emergency vehicles. This means that the roads are clear of low hanging limbs and are wide enough for emergency vehicles to access and sanded and plowed if during winter months. Please make sure that your address is visible to the property to help ensure we can find you quickly and efficiently.

*Burn permits can be obtained through both Maine Forestry and Wardens Report Websites. Please make sure to always obtain a permit prior to a burn and always have it in hand along with the appropriate items required to put the fire out quickly if need be. Burn permits are free so don't risk the chance of getting a fine for not having one. Burn barrels are no longer legal to burn in.

*** We had another successful pig roast. We thank the community for their support in this event. This helps the fireman's association purchase items throughout the year that are needed during meetings, training, or special events. A huge thank you to Shawn and Sarah Hiller for their donation of a pig for this event. It was greatly appreciated. We look forward to this event again in 2025.**

It continues to be my honor and great privilege to serve as the fire Chief for Cushing Community. I couldn't do what I do if it wasn't for the dedicated men and women that work alongside of me. We continue to face daily challenges in this profession but are dedicated and committed to doing what needs to be done to continue to serve the people of Cushing.

Cushing Emergency Management

Annual Report 2024

It has again been a busy year for EMA. There were two storms that were within 2 weeks of each other that caused significant damage throughout our county that used up a lot of EMA resources. We continue to have monthly meetings with all the county EMA directors to keep everyone updated on any important information.

Knox County has had many struggles around our Emergency Dispatch Center this past year. Due to staffing, the decision was made to have another neighboring dispatch center answer Knox County's emergency calls. This has posed many challenges both for the current staff at dispatch as well as to the community and their emergency needs. In the spring of 2024, Knox County Dispatch was turned back over to our county to again answer 911 calls. The transition for Knox County call center has continued with its struggles. Staffing has again posed a danger of the call center not being able to maintain the 911 part of the call center. I have started the process of looking into what other options may be available to meet our 911 needs.

Cushing's Community Warming Shelter is in the same building as the Town Office, and is a place where Cushing residents who are without power for an extended amount of time can go to get warm, or charge cell phones etc. We are currently trying to get a team of volunteers together for the warming shelter. This would consist of a 2-to-3-hour time block where you would go to the warming shelter to make sure that anyone who was in fact needing to utilize these needs were being met, whether it be charging phones, staying warm, or just having good conversation. This is something that rarely is needed in Cushing, but we want to make sure that we have it available. If anyone is interested in helping, please contact the town office. This does take a community and can't be done without a few people willing to help their neighbor.

It is not only a great idea but strongly recommended to have an emergency supply kit stocked and ready in the event of an outage. In your kit you should include the following items:

- * Three day supply of water (1 gallon per person / per day)
- * Non-Perishable food, and non-electric can opener
- * First aid kit, along with any prescription medication
- * Battery powered radio
- * Flashlight with plenty of extra batteries

Assemble your needed supplies and store them together in a central location.

With a two-year commitment Cushing Rescue will pay 100% of tuition. Along with being a member this department pays an hourly rate for responding to calls and we have on call pay to which we are competitive with other departments. ***** IS YOUR HOUSE NUMBER VISIBLE? *****

For privacy reasons all dispatch information is given in relation to a property address only, no names are used over the air. For this reason, it is important that all properties are clearly identified with numbers visible from both directions on the street. The town requires that you have reflective street numbers, **4 inches high**, preferably on your mailbox. Crews and ambulances may be coming from either direction. In addition, for serious events, mutual-aid ambulances may be coming from out of town and those drivers will not be familiar with the area. Clear numbering may be critical in ensuring the earliest possible treatment. **When you drive home at night, look at your mailbox. Can you see your number? No? Neither can we.**

Thank you to the resident and business of Cushing in their continued support and generosity through gifts and donations to Friend of Cushing Rescue, our non-profit support group. With this support we are able to properly equip our ambulance to an advance level. Donations will let us buy supplies use on the ambulance and new apparel for our members.

Maine EMS Stabilization Program was awarded to Cushing Rescue in 2024 in the sum of \$21,955.05. with this program we were able to purchase a new laptop and 65-inch TV for training. We purchased a new cardiac monitor LifePak 35, this will replace our 10-year-old Zoll.

In 2024 we responded to 161 calls for service, that is 31% growth from last year.. This would be the highest run volume for the department. 156 of those calls required treatment and transport. The rest of the call included but were not limited to support of the Cushing Fire Department at fire scenes, patient refusals, traffic accident and mutual aid in 2024.

In closing we need the continued support of the people and businesses of Cushing. In the time of an emergency be calm and call 911.

Health Officer Report

2024 showed a continued downward trend for COVID-19 in our community, though we are of course in peak season for COVID-19 and other communicable respiratory diseases. Every household is entitled to four free self-testing kits through the federal CDC at [covidtests.gov](https://www.cdc.gov/covidtests); don't hesitate to order for yourself and your family. Influenza and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) are also very prevalent this time of year, so please exercise care and caution if you're feeling under the weather!

Last year was also a high-water mark for tick-borne illnesses with the state reporting the highest rates of tick-borne illnesses in years. Given how unpredictable the temperatures have been this winter, be aware that ticks will be active at any time of the year if the temperature is above freezing. If you're out and about on the next unseasonably warm winter day, please take preventative measures to protect yourself from ticks. If you suspect a bite and/or find a tick on your person, please check in with your primary care provider as soon as possible for testing.

Once the cold weather is behind us, we unfortunately can still count on the appearance of brown tail moths again this year. If you are sensitive to the brown tail moth hairs, be sure to assess the trees and shrubs around you for any signs of overwinter webs. Should you find any sign, don't hesitate to call 211 or the Maine Forest Service at 207-287-2431 for guidance and assistance.

As we all know, the public health issues we all can contend with are far more than weather, communicable diseases, and brown tail moths. If you are struggling with anything that may be impacting your health - housing, abuse, nutrition, illness, and the like - dialing 211 or visiting "211maine.org" will help get you in touch with the right people and organizations to assist you.

Finally, I would like to again express my appreciation for the members of our town's online communities who regularly post information about road conditions, hazards, and other events that may have an impact on our fellow citizens. Each of you are helping to make Cushing a safer and healthier home for us all.

BOARD OF ASSESSORS

TOWN REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2024

In 2024, Cushing saw the completion of a Town-wide property revaluation. We thank those residents who participated and cooperated with the Assessors' Agents as they completed their task of assessing each and every property. With the completion of the revaluation, we saw an increase to the tax base which enabled a decrease in the Mil Rate from 16.0 to 10.13 if we were to collect the same amount as last year.

However, the amount required to be collected rose. The Knox County budget increased by 20.2%, the RSU 13 education budget increased by 0.6% and the Municipal budget increased by 15.2%. The Town's budget increased by approximately 4% due to those rising costs. Also, the Maine State Revenue Sharing was down 9.7%. Consequently, the Mil Rate for 2024 was set at 10.75 in order to meet the Town's current obligations.

The total taxable valuation base of the Town increased from \$296,740,960 (figures based on 2012 market) to \$461,370,990 (based on 2024 market) which is approximately a 55% increase. Due to our successful revaluation, the Town was able to certify assessments at 100%, that is, the assessments we have on our books were within 10% plus or minus of real-world values. Therefore, exemptions (e.g. homestead) were deducted from qualifying accounts at their maximum rate while the State will reimburse the Town at the maximum rate also; both of which helped alleviate some of the tax burden (amount required to be collected) for Cushing property owners.

The assessors' agents were agreeable to work with taxpayers who had questions about their assessments even if they missed deadlines to make changes. So far, five abatements have been issued, and four abatements have been denied. If you feel that you have an error in your assessment, but haven't yet made your concerns known, please contact the assessors' agents before April 1st to have your concerns addressed for the 2025 tax year. Interior Inspections may also be requested depending on the nature of the request.

The low number of requests for abatements is an indication of the high quality of the methods employed during the reassessment process. In the coming years we will continue to strive for thorough reviews throughout the year to ensure assessments remain fair and equitable. This will ensure that property taxes are paid on current and fair market values across the town and to make certain the tax burden continues to be spread equitably.

In addition to the revaluation, the assessors worked on numerous other tasks including intent to build permits, reviewing exemption applications, current use applications, tree growth penalties and property transfers. 2024 saw 86 property transfers, some including

land splits which have been updated on the town tax maps which can be found online at www.maineassessment.com/cushing or viewed at the Cushing Town Office.

PLANNING BOARD Annual Report for 2023

The Planning Board meets on the first Wednesday of each month at 6:00 pm if there are applications to review. These public meetings are posted in advance of the meeting. The Board, consisting of five members, reviews applications as required by the Cushing Shoreland Zone Ordinance and the Subdivision Regulation. Work sessions are held as needed.

Both Bill Aboud and Bob Ellis resigned from the planning board following many years of dedicated service. The current board members appreciate the body of knowledge these two members created and that they did their best to pass it on to others.

This year, the Board closed out as incomplete the Water's Edge Subdivision application. That application highlighted the need to ensure that adequate fire-fighting water facilities were available, Cisterns are now required to store water sufficient for the Cushing Fire Department to provide fire suppression where a fire pond is not available. The Subdivision Regulations have been amended accordingly.

The Board also held several work sessions to continue work on a new revised Shoreland Zone Ordinance. The upgrading of our ordinance to comply with the State's 2015 model is complete and we will be submitting the amended document to the State Commissioner for compliance review. This biggest gain for new applications is that the 30% size restriction on extension of structures in the Resource Protection District is now measured by footprint rather than volume. This will be in force once the citizens approve the new ordinance.

Meanwhile the Board has been reviewing and adjudicating applications from homeowners.

The aerial photographs of the Town have been completed and will become available on a new comprehensive mapping viewer being developed by Leticia vanVuuren, the Knox County Geospatial Database Manager

The Board is very pleased that Gene Lukianov and Tom Nichols have joined us and we thank them for stepping up.

2024 Annual Report

A special thanks to those vessel operators who exercised a high degree of professionalism throughout Cushing waters. There are a negligible number of incidents here. We do have a few holdouts, commercial and private, who seem oblivious to the need for caution. I would remind all that these are commercial fishing waters. I ask all vessel operators to exercise caution around active lobster boats where the busy crew may be briefly unaware of a nearby vessel. Similarly, I ask our larger boats to reciprocate when it comes to speed and wake.

Harbor Committee

I have asked the Select Board to fill all open Harbor Board positions and will then request that a Harbor Board meeting be scheduled. We need to revisit the mooring and marking rules, and determine an easy process to ensure compliance, especially when a mooring is misused, abandoned or transferred.

In the past year there have been multiple boats rafted on one mooring. This is unsafe and should not occur.

The State has asked for various map plots with moorings which I need to provide. We have the technology to do this, but all mooring owners must have a permit for that to happen. If you do not have a permit, please apply for one now.

Proper Mooring Markings.

Our Coastal Waters Management Ordinance currently defines mooring marking rules as:

- a. Each mooring marker shall bear the number of its permit or vessel identification, AND the watercraft or owner's name or initials.
- b. Guest moorings shall be marked by a white ball bearing the permit number or owner name or initials, AND the word GUEST.
- c. Service moorings shall be marked by a white ball bearing the permit number or owner name or initials, AND the word PRIVATE.
- d. Rental moorings shall be marked by a white ball bearing the permit number or owner name or initials, AND the word RENTAL.
- e. Aquaculture moorings shall be marked by a white ball bearing the permit number issued by Maine Department of Marine Resources.

A float that is not attached to a wharf by traditional means shall display reflective tape

Please observe all navigation buoys, speed limit markers and ordinance defined zones.

Animal Control Officer's Report 2024

The Animal Control Officer for the town of Cushing is responsible for enforcing animal control laws of the State of Maine. Duties include situations such as responding to reports of animals suspected of having rabies, complaints about loose or stray animals, and addressing concerns about domestic animals that might represent a nuisance or hazard to public health or safety. The Cushing Animal Control Officer is responsible for domestic animals only, not wildlife. The Inland Fisheries and Wildlife wardens are responsible for wildlife issues. There are revolving game wardens who cover multiple areas. You may contact the IF&W wardens by calling: 207-287-8000.

The State of Maine requires all dogs over the age of 6 months to be current with rabies vaccines and be licensed with the town. Dog licenses are issued each calendar year and cover from January 1-December 31. Licenses are available beginning October 15th of each year. Fees are \$6 per altered dog and \$11 per intact dog. Licenses can be obtained at the town office in person or over the phone. You may also register and renew licenses online by visiting: Maine.gov/online/dog license. There is a small additional fee to purchase a dog license online or over the phone. Be aware also that Maine charges a \$25 late fee per dog beginning February 1st.

Please visit the Cushing town website at Cushing.Maine.gov for news, events and information related to domestic animals. There is also a Facebook page, Town of Cushing Message Board, where you may learn about animals. That have been found or post a message about an animal that is missing. This is a useful tool so that we can all work together to help care for our community's animal friends.

Note: There is currently no leash law regarding cats.

Cushing Recreation Department



The Cushing Recreation Department would like to once again thank the town of Cushing for supporting their mission to provide children in our community the opportunity for healthy recreational involvement. Sports can improve academic achievement, creativity, critical thinking and determination in youth. Additional benefits for children that participate in sports are keeping active and fit, learning to make decisions for themselves, working with others for a common goal, strengthening peer relationships, and working on their confidence and self-esteem.

After several years of declining numbers in our youth athletic teams, Cushing once again had full rosters this past year. Dear Cushing Board of Selectpersons:

The Board of Trustees is grateful for the past support the town of Cushing has provided to our community-based library, where we offer free services and programs for all residents of Cushing. We are writing to ask for \$3,500 to continue to maintain and improve the library's collections and services.

Thanks to the steadfast support of our patrons and town government, the Library had an excellent year. We happily welcomed quite a few new patrons, which is every Library's dream! We also added another dedicated volunteer, which helps keep our current schedule in place. For those who are unable to visit the library, curbside pick-up service is still available. Both of our patron computers are available for free use. The community can also access our WIFI service on a 24/7 basis from outside the Library, by following information posted on the outer door.

For families and children, the Library is a wonderful place to be! First and foremost, we added some great new books to our children and young adult collections this year! The ever-popular Preschool Story and Craft Time was well-attended, as were some lively presentations by Maine children's authors. The Easter Egg Hunt was a great success, with nearly 82 adults and children in attendance. We hid over 1,000 candy-filled eggs! Recently, we hosted 51 adults and children at our Annual Holiday Event, which included games, ornament making, a scavenger hunt and a visit from Santa.

The Library is proud of its partnership with the Cushing Community School. We assisted with "*Creatures from the Deep*" a free 8-week after-school art and nature workshop for Cushing Community School children, grades 3 - 5, which took place at the Library. Prints of children's amazing work are on display here for all to enjoy. This summer, we took a different approach for our summer reading program. We worked with the school to create five Summer Reading Adventure Bags, which can be checked out. Each bag is filled with fun books and activities based on a theme. We supported the school's Book Fair again by providing each student with funds to purchase books.

We continue to serve our community by offering diverse presentations for everyone, free of charge. We like to think of these presentations as portals to the wide world. Our programming collaborations with the Cushing Historical Society and the Thomaston Public Library are a wonderful way to bring new ideas and experiences to the community. We are already planning our next adventures for 2025 with our community and local partners.

There were so many interesting things to do this year, such as

- Participate in "The Mirror of Maine", a facilitated reading group for adults which focused on the meaning of community.

The Library has maintained its involvement with the internationally renowned Camden Conference, whose mission is to foster informed discourse on world issues. The theme for 2024 was *Democracy Under Threat: A Global Perspective*. We hosted the first of two outstanding Camden Conference programs in November, and will offer the other in January, 2025.

Finally, as a lovely way to begin the holiday season, we were very fortunate to host a free screening of a delightful Hallmark Christmas movie, “A Biltmore Christmas”, presented by the director of the film! Over 70 people gathered to see the film & enjoy hot chocolate and holiday treats.

2024 Cushing Recycling News

The Cushing-Friendship-Waldoboro Transfer Station (CFWTS) reports that residents are preparing their recyclables well.

The trash haulers, though, want to emphasize that some households are co-mingling all recyclables into one bin. Recycling in our town is **NOT SINGLE STREAM**. Households should pre-sort their recyclables.

Your trash haulers cannot take the time to sort your recyclables for you.

REMEMBER: at this time the only plastics accepted at the Transfer Station are HDPE (#2 plastics), RIGID PLASTIC, and GROCERY STORE PLASTIC BAGS



Look on the container's bottom for the chasing arrows recycling symbol containing the identifying #2 HDPE.

#2 Milk Jugs ("natural color" HDPE) plastics should be kept separate from other "colored" #2 HDPE plastics such as laundry or dish detergent jugs

RIGID PLASTIC: buckets, soda crates, plastic toys, plant pots, kiddie pools, truck liners are still being recycled at CFWTS.

- RIGID PLASTICS: buckets, soda crates, toys, pots pools, truck liners
- GLASS: clear, green and blue bottles (*not brown*) and jars, (no Pyrex or window glass)
- USED MOTOR OIL: deliver to Waste Oil Furnace at Todd Prior's Garage in Cushing

- PAINT: oil and acrylic. There is no charge for recycling oil or acrylic paint.
- HARD GOODS: appliances, refrigerators, freezers, toasters, dehumidifiers, etc.
- BATTERIES: batteries, car batteries, alkaline batteries, rechargeable batteries, watch and hearing aid batteries, etc. NEVER throw lithium-ion batteries into the hopper, because THEY ARE A SEVERE FIRE RISK.
- UNIVERSAL WASTE: computers, printers, TVs, radios
- FLUORESCENT and CF bulbs, thermostats, ballast, all other light bulbs
- BULKY WASTE such as couches, chairs, mattresses, rugs, etc.
- CDD construction/demolition debris
- BRUSH, trees smaller than 6" in diameter
- TIRES



Important suggestions from our trash haulers

HOW TO PREPARE WHAT YOU PUT INTO THE RED RECYCLING BIN

- ★ **MOST IMPORTANT:** Each household is responsible to *pre-sort the recyclables*. *Do not co-mingle the recyclables*. We are *not single-streaming*.
- ★ Bag like-items for easy pick-up by the hauler.
Do not seal any bags containing recyclables.
- ★ #2 plastic must be kept separate.
- ★ The following items are **Not Recyclable**: Kitchen plastic wrap, Boat Shrink Wrap, Styrofoam trays nor Foam Peanuts. They must go into the trash.
- ★ All *rinsed* metals, tin cans, aluminum can be mixed together.
- ★ UPDATE: Newspapers/Magazines, Mixed papers, and all Books go into one bag.
- ★ TETRA PAKS ARE NOT RECYCLED: juice, milk, broth, soup containers should go into the regular trash because their multiple layered construction is too difficult to recycle. So, put TETRA PAKS into the trash.
- ★ Leave paint in cans; do not seal into bags. CFWTS participates in a state-wide paint recycling program and CFWTS accepts oil and latex paints *without charge*.
- ★ CFLs or fluorescent light tubes must be protected from breaking.
- ★ Take used motor oil to be burned in Prior Garage's waste oil furnace in Cushing.

WATER QUALITY REPORT 2024

Submitted by: Georges River Regional Shellfish Management

As written by David Taylor, Chair of G.R.R.S.C. and approved by the Joint Board of Selectmen for Georges River Regional Shellfish Management: Daniel Staples, Chair, Wayne Luce, Vice Chair, Sandy Moore, Sue Snow, and Tammy Willey

Georges River Regional Shellfish Management was established as an Interlocal Agreement in 1996 for the conservation of waterways in which shellfish are harvested in the towns of Cushing, South Thomaston Saint George, Thomaston and Warren.

Rainfall is a big factor in water quality as it brings pollution off the land into the brooks that run into the rivers and ocean. With that being said, every town has to educate the residents on picking up dog waste and taking care of other animal waste like horses, cows, poultry, etc.

We were able to get Four Winds Housing Development in South Thomaston, which has a healthy biomass (clams), open this year. Testing site 34 in the Bay needs to be monitored and make sure the people living in the cottage put in a leach field as human waste was found with DNA testing this summer. A few other areas around Georges Island were opened up this year.

In the last five years G.R.R.S.C. has spent 25,000 in DNA testing. A lot more testing is needed, but lack of help makes it hard to get more areas done. I've been talking with DEP about Byron's Brook in Thomaston about pollution coming from the brook. We met with DEP on December 20th to look over Byron's Brook. We'll probably need monthly testing for a year on top of what we have already done to establish a pattern of pollution.

Due to the pollution, Georges River will need a lot more work on the upper half of the river as we have lost from Hospital Point to almost Smiths Cove from January to June.

Overall water scores seem to be improving slowly. There are 5,980 acres of a very fragile ecosystem within the five towns. The GRRSM is committed to conservation of this precious resource.

Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 505(4) to charge interest at a rate of 6 % per year on taxes not paid in accordance with the tax bill due date.

Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. §506-A to set the interest rate to be paid by the Town on abated taxes at 2 % per year.

Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to take money from Undesignated Funds to pay abated taxes.

Art. 42. To see if the Town will authorize the municipal officers to dispose of tax acquired property as they deem in the best interests of the Town, except that the municipal officers shall first use the sale process in 36 M.R.S. § 943-C if they choose to sell property to anyone other than the former owner, as defined in § 943-C. For sales to someone other than the former owner, excess sale proceeds, as defined in 36 M.R.S. § 943-C, shall be returned to the former owner.

Art. 43. To see if the Town will vote to accept the various State Reimbursements, such as Municipal Revenue Sharing Funds, Tree Growth, Veteran’s Tax Exemption, Urban Rural Initiative (road fund), Fuel Tax Refund, Snowmobile Refund, General Assistance, Small Community Grant Program, and any and all kinds of property relief as provided by the State Legislature to the Town in the fiscal year 2025.

Art. 44. To see if the Town will vote to accept and appropriate, for the purposes for which they are received, the proceeds of all grants made to the Town during the Town’s fiscal year by the federal or state government, their agencies and authorities; and to see if

the Town will vote that any necessary matching funds be appropriated by Town Meeting and that any substantive conditions other than a standard grant condition regarding spending only for the purpose for which the grant is made, be approved by Town Meeting.

Art. 45. To see if the Town will vote to increase the property tax levy limit established for the Town of Cushing by State law in the event that the municipal budget approved under the preceding articles will result in a tax commitment that is greater than the property tax levy limit.

Art. 46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the municipal officers to dispose of town-owned personal property under such terms and conditions as they deem advisable.

Art. 47. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, donations, trust funds, and contributions in the form of money, personal services, and materials for the benefit of the Town, its government including legal departments and public facilities thereof, for the purpose of aiding and enhancing the delivery of public services. Said gifts to be without conditions and not require the voters to raise additional maintenance money.

Art. 48. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board to borrow money in anticipation of tax receipts and to borrow or transfer funds as they deem advisable to meet unanticipated year 2026 budget accounts from January 1, 2026, until the 2026 annual meeting.
